












Main areas of action

The Joint Programme focuses on the following inter-connected main areas of action to ensure girls' and young women's empowerment, and their transition into healthy adulthood through quality education. This holistic and comprehensive approach promotes gender equality and ultimately contributes to the achievement of the 2030 Agenda for **Sustainable Development.**



Quality education

Improving the quality and relevance of education for adolescent girls and young women through policy advocacy, curriculum development and support to school management.



Health and well-being

Strengthening linkages between the health and education sectors to respond to the needs of adolescent girls and young women at risk of early pregnancy and school dropout through water and sanitation facilities, and comprehensive sexuality education (CSE).



Enabling environments

Addressing the structural barriers to girls' education through advocacy and community engagement, and supporting institutional and legislative change and inter-sectoral coordination.



Building the evidence base

Documenting and collecting relevant data to target interventions, and to inform gender-responsive policies and actions.
